### Asheboro Friends Meeting Thoughts from Parker J. Palmer - February 15, 2025

Heartbreak goes hand-in-hand with being fully human. If you love something or someone, at some point your heart will break.

It's how we live in and thru our heartbreak that makes the difference in our lives and the lives of those we touch. Will we let the experience shut us down in resentment and bitterness, or will we let it open us to largeness of life?

Here's a poem about allowing heartbreak to move us toward loving more, not less. Doing so, says the poet, is not an act of will, as if we could command ourselves to love when our world has turned to ashes. Instead, it's what the heart itself does as it goes on beating, "as if it knows/the only cure for love/is more of it."

When I've been broken so badly that even loving my own life felt impossible, attending to the simple fact that my heart was still beating helped me make it thru, one small step at a time. When our minds can't make sense of life, it's good to know we have access to other sources of wisdom, imprinted in our bodies by millennia of human experience.

Memo to Self: Don't override bodily wisdom with downward spiraling thoughts. As Mary Oliver wrote, "let the soft animal of your body love what it loves"—and it loves life.

Let us agree for now that we will not say the breaking makes us stronger or that it is better to have this pain than to have done without this love.

Let us promise we will not tell ourselves time will heal the wound, when every day our waking opens it anew.

Perhaps for now it can be enough to simply marvel at the mystery of how a heart so broken can go on beating, as if it were made for precisely this—

as if it knows the only cure for love is more of it, as if it sees the heart's sole remedy for breaking is to love still.

as if it trusts that its own persistent pulse is the rhythm of a blessing we cannot begin to fathom but will save us nonetheless.



### **Excerpt:** Answering the Call

Irma [Morris] was the director of a childcare facility at the United Methodist Church in Wilmore, Kentucky, and had been recorded as a Friends minister by Iowa Yearly Meeting. While my husband Steve attended Asbury Theological Seminary, I worked for Irma in the afternoons with schoolaged children.


One Saturday afternoon, Irma invited me over to her house to help make homemade noodles which she intended to carry to the Friends fellowship dinner the next day. As we talked together, I learned about her life. She told me it was my great-grandfather, JT Molloy from Iowa, who had recognized her call to public ministry. When she was eighty-seven years old, Irma wrote me a letter describing this moment in her life and her subsequent ministry as a woman:



"In fact, I have discovered some interesting things in my memory bank. I would never have chosen the public life, but a man named Jim Molloy walked from the east side of the church to the west side where I stood one Sunday morning, stuck his old crooked forefinger under my nose and said, 'I am going to live to see the day when you will stand behind that pulpit and preach the Gospel.' No one was more shocked than I. Being a teenager who had been raised to be polite, I did not laugh. Although I felt shock and felt it was something to laugh at, I have never forgotten that morning. It is as real as it ever was."

. As I got to know Irma better, I shared with her my leading to ministry which I had felt while a student at William Penn University. . . Irma and I realized there were those in the church who resisted women in ministry leadership. However, the ministry of women who responded to Jesus Christ faithfully can be found in the New Testament. Irma talked to me about the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14–30) and how we are each accountable to God for the stewardship of the life and abilities given to us. What will we say to the Lord when we get to heaven and are asked why we did not use our talents? Don't we want to hear from God, "Well done, good and faithful servant?" Is it acceptable to do nothing because we listen to discouraging voices who say women should not be found in ministry? Talking with Irma, I decided not to be afraid of following my calling and listening with sacred discernment to the voice of God.
