

Sowing the Seed of Truth Arrives

From the introduction, by editor Sabrina Darnowsky:

"When he was 43 years old and had been a minister for five years, Murray Shipley obtained a 9-by-14-inch bound blank book with 282 ruled and numbered pages, similar to the record books used by his Quaker meeting for its business minutes. He filled the first dozen or so pages with systematic notes from his studies of the Bible, typically focusing on a single word like comfort or riches, and then writing a long list of scriptures that contained that word, forming his own personal concordance. Sometimes he expressed a few of his



own thoughts on the subject; at other times he included quotations from the work of prominent Protestant preachers and scholars, demonstrating his own evangelical ecumenism. Eventually, he began writing out his own sermons.

"Nearly half of the sermons included the date and occasionally the place and time when the message was given. It is uncertain whether the undated sermons were not delivered or were simply not identified in the same way as the others. Of those that were geographically labeled, nine were delivered in Cincinnati; three in New Burlington, Ohio (about fifty miles north of Cincinnati); and one in Newport, Rhode Island. In the late spring of 1874, Shipley and several members of his family began more than a year-long stay in Kendal, England. While overseas he preached several sermons in Kendal; one each in Darlington, Kent, and Liverpool, England; and one possibly in Switzerland.

"The majority of his messages were delivered on Sunday, presumably during morning worship, although several were given on weekdays, possibly at a mid-week or evening meeting. Others, however, were shared at venues outside of worship. The message in Darlington was given at a First-Day School Conference, and one in Kendal was at the Kendal Mission Meeting.

"Although Shipley stated that he sought to deliver his messages 'as [God] sees is suited and suitable at the time,' the chronology of his journal suggests that he at least occasionally broke with the old Quaker tradition of impromptu preaching and wrote down his messages in advance. For example, the first sermon in his journal has a delivery date of March 14, 1875, while the next one with a date was given on May 26, 1873, indicating that his first sermon was written about two years before it was spoken. He even delivered one particular sermon on two separate occasions: once in Cincinnati, Ohio on June 1, 1873 and again in Kendal, England on June 10, 1874. This sidestepped a longstanding Quaker injunction against reusing sermon material, lest it not meet the immediate needs of the moment. The last date given to a sermon was October 30, 1876. . .

"Despite periodic deviations from historical preaching practices, Shipley shared with early Quaker ministers a common desire: to turn his listeners toward God and encourage them to lead pure and loving lives, not because of religious tradition or outward dictates, but because of an inner transformation that resulted from a direct experience of the divine."








FUM Will Host Book Study Group
