

A Message from your Pastor & Parker J. Palmer - May 15, 2024 Walking to Oak-Head Pond, and Thinking of the Ponds I Will Visit in the Next Days and Weeks — Mary Oliver

What is so utterly invisible as tomorrow?
Not love,
not the wind,

not the inside of stone.

Not anything.

And yet, how often I'm fooled—
I'm wading along

in the sunlight—
and I'm sure I can see the fields
and the ponds shining
days ahead—
I can see the light spilling

like a shower of meteors into next week's trees, and I plan to be there soon and, so far, I am

just that lucky, my legs splashing over the edge of darkness, my heart on fire. I don't know where such certainty comes from the brave flesh or the theater of the mind—

but if I had to guess
I would say that only
what the soul is supposed to be
could send us forth

with such cheer as even the leaf must wear as it unfurls its fragrant body, and shines

against the hard possibility of stoppage—which, day after day, before such brisk, corpuscular belief, shudders, and gives way.

Here's Mary Oliver, reflecting on how we keep assuming we'll be given another day, even though tomorrow is never guaranteed. Instead of calling us foolish for acting as if tomorrow were in the bag, she celebrates the fact that life's most basic impulse is to keep on living, no matter the odds. In the words of that old joke, MO would never have said, "At my age, I don't even buy green bananas."

In a famous line from another poem, she asks, "Tell me, what is it you plan to do / with your one wild and precious life?" She wants us to be animated not by fear but by the soul that keeps sending us forth "with such cheer."

Memo to Self: Keep leaning into life until you can't. Live each moment as if there will be another and another, even though you know full-well they won't go on forever. Everyone gets one wild and precious life, so keep on buying green bananas!

Mary Jane Oliver (September 10, 1935 – January 17, 2019) was an American poet who won the National Book Award and the Pulitzer Prize. Her work is inspired by nature, rather than the human world, stemming from her lifelong passion for solitary walks in the wild.

Parker Jay Palmer is an American Quaker author, poet, educator, and activist who focuses on issues in education, community, leadership, spirituality and social change. He describes himself thusly:

"I told them," he says, 'that I lived in the virtue of that life and power that takes away the occasion of all wars...I was come into the covenant of peace which was before wars and strifes were.' It was a remarkable position for a young [George Fox] to take and it was oddly enough expressed. The covenant of peace into which he



had come was almost certainly in his mind the life of the Spirit. He felt that he was raised to the nature and type of the new Adam and was forever done with the ways of the Adam who fell, and it seemed to him that the new and higher life entailed a spirit and method of life which were essentially Christlike. It is a way of life that practices love and forbearance. It seeks to give rather than to get. It conquers by grace and gentleness. It prefers to suffer injustice than in the slightest degree to do it. It wins and triumphs by sacrifice and self-giving. It spreads abroad an atmosphere of trust and confidence and proposes to prepare the way for a new world by creation of a new spirit which is essentially the spirit of the Cross. If every one lived thus, there would be no occasion of war but a covenant of peace."

How do cicadas make noise? The cicada sound is created by tymbals, which are specialized structures found on the abdomen of the males. 

Observations After a Tornado

Today we sat in the Winchester (Indiana) Ministerial Association meeting listening to the story of the complete destruction of one of the three churches destroyed in the tornado seven weeks ago. There were five people in the building when the thirty-five-year-old church building was literally blown apart. Only one person had injuries. Last week, we talked with a friend in their 80s who is still struggling with the decision of whether to rebuild their destroyed home or just buy another home someplace else. We hear every day the agony of decision after decision needing to be made about home repairs or rebuilding homes that will cost hundreds of thousands of dollars more than what insurance will offer. These stories are difficult to hear and the trauma is still raw after almost two months.



The violence of the tornado affected the whole community. Destruction is still visible to everyone, every day. Those who did not lose a home may have lost their employment at the local nursing home or restaurant. The loss of power in the community for days meant spoiled food for many who were already food insecure. The randomness of a tornado is no respecter of wealth or age, whether you had insurance or not. As the weeks go by, many are discovering hidden damage to roofs and structures and are thrown into turmoil with decisions and repairs and struggling with insurance companies. It feels like almost everyone is discovering they were underinsured after dealing with insurance companies and depreciation. I ask everyone from outside our community, "Do you know what your insurance policy will cover in a natural disaster?"

This tornado in Winchester, Indiana, has been especially hard on the elderly. A large nursing home was destroyed and will not be rebuilt, sending all the residents out of the community. An assisted living facility had extensive damage and the thirty-five residents are now housed in a local hotel and will be for the next six to nine months while repairs are made. Most of the independent living condos surrounding the assisted living building were damaged, and three or four completely destroyed. These retired friends are also in a hotel or with family for the next coming months.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has communicated that it will not help Winchester recover and the city has formed a Long-Term Recovery Team and is currently trying to raise six million dollars to make the community whole again. This is just to help nonprofit organizations help the uninsured or underinsured. It is a complicated, long process to recover and it has just begun. Winchester Friends received generous donations from individuals and the wider Society of Friends over the past weeks. These funds are being used for individuals who are uninsured or underinsured and have emergency needs or to help with professional home inspections. From our own funds we will help the three other churches destroyed by the tornado.

And then there are the trees. One of the members of our Meeting lost over forty trees on his acreage, including four large apple trees. For Earth Day this year, our Missions Committee helped them purchase three apple trees to begin the process of undoing the damage done by this tornado to the trees in our county. One Friend has decided it is time to lobby our state legislature to make purchasing and planting trees tax deductible. It will help our planet and our county in the aftermath of a tornado. It only makes sense.

At the Ministerial Association meeting today, we all talked of the miracle of no deaths the night of the tornado. We did lose one person several weeks after the event, but we know this violent tornado could have been much worse. All we have to do is watch the evening news to see this destruction happening again and again all across our country. This past Sunday, our faith community celebrated our 151st year here in Winchester and we know we are called to be present at this time to our community. These next several years will be filled with hard work and we are privileged to participate. We are grateful for the help sent our way in the aftermath of this violence by so many across Friends United Meeting.
